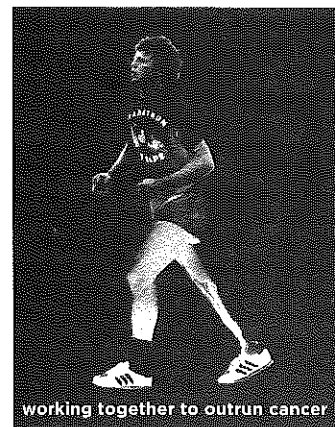

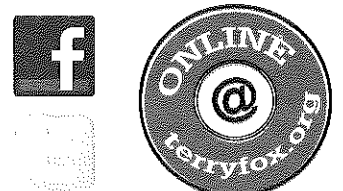

He tries 3,000-mile run on one real leg

ST. JOHN'S (CP) — A man who lost his leg to cancer three years ago has set off on a marathon run across Canada to raise money for the Canadian Cancer Society.

Before leaving here, Terry Fox, 21, of Port Coquitlam, B.C. dipped his artificial leg in the harbor and said he wants to do the same when he reaches Vancouver.

"My home is in British Columbia and I want to finish at home," he said. He plans to run about 30 miles (50 kilometres) a day and reckons his artificial leg will need repair or replacement about once a week. The War Amputees Association of Canada says it will help.

"The only limit is the one you set yourself." I have lived by this motto my whole life. In 2012, as I was working towards a soccer scholarship, I was faced with a challenge I never imagined. At 16, I was diagnosed with osteosarcoma (bone cancer) above my knee, the same cancer as Terry Fox. I was amazed to hear my surgeon say that my leg could be saved. I knew then that nothing could limit me, not even a disease like cancer.

Growing up, Terry was always my hero, an incredible athlete who has inspired Canadians to raise hundreds of millions of dollars for cancer research. Today's cancer patients are beating cancer and living healthy lives thanks to progress made in research. The chemotherapy is less harsh on our bodies; treatment is shorter; and people like me are able to keep both our legs.

Terry was one individual who wanted to make a difference. He has made a difference in my life — and so have you. Thank you so much for fundraising for cancer research. You change lives for the better every day.

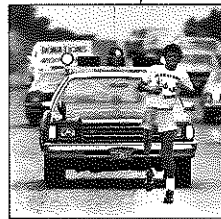

Tears flow as Metro hails Terry

They called Terry Fox the toast of Toronto and he claimed he was just an ordinary guy.

They stopped traffic in the heart of the city at high noon for him and he confessed he found the fanfare almost painful.

Yet every person who lined University Ave., yesterday or packed into Nathan Phillips Square to see the one-legged runner, knew they had been touched, however, briefly, by a Canadian of rare courage.

As one man shouted out, "This is the kind of welcome we give the Queen."

Fox, who lost his right leg to cancer three years ago, is running 5,300 miles across Canada on a Marathon of Hope to raise money for cancer research. He's scheduled to run from Kingston Rd. along Danforth Ave. to Bloor St. and Avenue Rd. starting at 1:30 p.m. today.

Fox will run in Metro for the last time tomorrow. He'll leave Nathan Phillips Square at 9 a.m. and jog along Lakeshore Blvd. and is expected at Highway 10 at 11:30 a.m.

Police estimated 10,000 people crowded the bandstand in front of City Hall in 30C temperatures to honor the 21-year-old student from Port Coquitlam, B.C.

Many cried on the streets and pressed close against his police escort just to have a moment's contact.

Welder aids Terry's run

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (UPC) — Terry Fox, the gutsy 22-year-old amputee, had to interrupt his cross-Canada run for cancer research briefly so a welder could repair his artificial leg.

Fox, whose "Marathon of Hope" has already raised \$1.4 million for cancer research, had to stop 15½ miles (25 kilometres) outside of town yesterday because of a malfunction of a small spring in his artificial right leg.

A local welder responded to a radio station's appeal for help, however, and within 90 minutes Fox was back on the road.

About 6,000 residents lined the streets to cheer on Canada's newest hero in his bid to run from St. John's, Nfld., to Vancouver, B.C. to raise money for cancer research.
